# Theater Review: 'Hearts Like Fists' Beats Fast, Funny and Affecting For Actors Bridge 20th Season Opener

Playwright Adam Szymkowicz knows how to write dynamic scenes that engage deep-rooted

emotions while simultaneously tickling the funny bone. Enjoyable proof of his superhuman writing skill is on high-octane display at **Belmont University's Black Box Theatre** as **Actors Bridge Ensemble** unleashes its twentieth anniversary season with the superhero satire "Hearts Like Fists."

Our heroes are three women – Nina (Cassie Hamilton), Jazmin (Brooke Gronemeyer) and Sally (LaTorius Givens) – who are nurses by day working with a, um, heartsick fellow sister of mercy (Kara McCleland) and Peter (Jess Darnell), a brilliant, well, heartthrob doctor who's trying to perfect an artificial heart to save the world from, sigh, heartbreak. But at night they become masked avengers seeking to quell crime in the big city – and they've just about done that, except for the extinguisher of love's flame known as Dr. X (Jack E. Chambers).



Only the looks-that-stop-traffic feisty femme known as Lisa (**Britt Byrd**) has encountered the evil MD and lived to tell about it – will she join our tenacious trio in their pursuit of justice or risk possibly greater peril by trying to forge a lasting relationship with Peter? Happily in this fast-paced 100-minute one-act you don't have to tune in tomorrow to find out.

This over-the-top theatrical comic book (aided greatly by **David Ian Lee** and **Carrie Brewer**'s crisp fight choreography, **Christen Heilman**'s colorful costume design for the superheroes and **Eli Van Sickel**'s inspired sound design – you'll never think of such tunes as "Love Theme [From


"Chinatown"], "Love Is a Many Splendored Thing" and "All By Myself" in the same way again after their hilarious use in this show's soundtrack) provides enough laughs to make even a supervillain guffaw. But in examining the damage of failed love from the opening scene as well as underscoring the courage it takes to risk loving others there's a solid center below this play's candy shell.



The entire cast (including strong support from **Austin Olive**, **Parker Arnold** and **Haley Rose Maurer**) plays Szymkowicz's deft blend of smart and silly beautifully. Chambers is best when he's given a role he can take to the wall (and through it), so his Dr. X from start to finish is a fiendish – though of course somewhat sympathetically tortured – delight. Hamilton, Givens, Gronemeyer and McCleland get the quirks in their respective characters across in very humorous fashion, though they too have more to offer than that. And Byrd and Darnell absolutely nail the young-conflicted-lovers motif.

Richard K. Davis' lighting design provides perfect framing (and there are two actual frames which I bet master carpenter Tony Nappo had a hand in constructing that create the look of comic book panels as well). Lee – who is presently appearing in Nashville Repertory Theatre's production of "Rapture, Blister, Burn" – and co-director Jessika Malone (the Actors Bridge artistic associate) have assembled actors and artisans and given them full license to turn Nashville's best black box into an urban jungle with a minimum of fuss and a

maximum of fun.



"Hearts Like Fists" is a blast of entertaining brio that signals the marks 20 years of presenting take-no-prisoners and bore-no-audiences theater for Actors Bridge Ensemble. Producing Artistic Director **Vali Forrister** and colleagues are still finding fresh ways to tell wonderful stories – bravo!

Actors Bridge Ensemble's production Adam Szymkowicz's "Hearts Like Fists" co-directed by Jessika Malone and David Ian Lee continues through **Sept. 20** at Belmont's Black Box Theatre (**1575 Compton Ave.**). Shows start at **7:30 p.m.** on **Thursdays**, **Fridays** and **Saturdays** with **Sunday** matinees at **4 p.m.** Tickets can be purchased in advance online for **\$20 by clicking** here or for **\$25** at the door. This play contains mature subject matter and situations; it is not intended for young audiences.


